One of my latest collector cars is a 1987 Lincoln Formal Town Car. I recently ordered personalized collector plates "4MAL 87" which describes the car quite well. I have put very few miles on the car in the year that I have had it. It seems that everyone who has owned it has driven it very little. The 24 year old car currently has 6800 miles on it. The Formal Town Car spent most of its life in California. Reportedly the original owner, who had it custom built by Cameo Coach, died after less than a year of ownership and had ridden in it for only 357 miles. His family kept the car but they did not use it for twelve years. They eventually donated the car to a charity auction. Before the auction, the keys were misplaced so at the auction it was sold as a possibly non running car. Owner #2 (David Stoupakis) bought it at the auction, found an extra set of keys in the car, and enjoyed the car for a few months, drove it only on special occasions, pushing the odometer to 1110 miles. I bought it from owner #3, Meghan and William Cooke III, who enjoyed the car for several years and 5500 miles with his family, and drove it to car events in southern California. When I saw the car on Ebay I was mesmerized. I liked everything about it; the retractable top over the driver's seat, the TV, bar, and serving tables in back, the blue leather interior, the two tone blue exterior, the formal 'look'. When I communicated with Mr. Cooke, I think he knew he was communicating with the next owner of this unique Lincoln. In the time he had it he could not find out anything about the original owner or

The Salvation Army, or before that **The** Christian Mission, is an evangelical Christian church known for charitable work. It is an international movement that currently works in 121 countries. It was founded in 1865 in the United Kingdom by William and Catherine Booth as the East London Christian Missíon and has a quasimilitary structure. William Booth was born in Nottingham in 1829, but was based in London from 1849 where, after working as a pawnbroker's assístant, he set himself up as an itinerant nreacher. He died in 1912.

The name *The Salva-tion Army* developed from an incident in May 1878. William Booth was dictating a letter to his secretary George Scott Railton and said, "We are a volunteer army." Bramwell Booth heard his

(Continued from page 3) father and said, "Volunteer, I'm no volunteer, I'm a regular!" Raílton was instructed to cross out the word "volunteer" and substitute the word "salvation". The Salvation Army was modeled after the military, with its own flag (or colors) and its own music, often with Christian words to popular and folkloric tunes sung in the pubs. Booth and the other soldiers in "God's Army" would wear the Army's own uniform, 'putting on the armour,' for meetings and ministry work. He became the "General" and his other ministers were given appropriate ranks as "officers". Other members became "soldiers".

The Salvation Army's stated mission is to perform evangelical, social and charitable work and bring the Christian message to the poor, destitute and hungry by meeting both their physical and spiritual needs. The organization states that its ministry extends to all, without discrimination.

When William Booth became known as the General, Catherine was known as the "Mother of The Salvation Army". William preached to the poor, and Catherine spoke to the wealthy, gaining financial support for their work. William Booth described the or-

In 1880, the Salvation Army started its work in three other countries: Australia, Ireland, and the United States. It was not always an official officer of the Salvation Army who started the Salvation Army in a new country; sometímes Salvationists emigrated to countries and started operating as "the Salvatíon Army" on their own authority. When the first official officers arrived in Australia and the United States. they found groups of Salvationists already waiting for them.

The Salvation Army's main converts were at first alcoholics, morphine addicts, prostitutes and other "undesírables" unwelcomed into polite Christian society, which helped prompt the Booths to start their own church. They believed that its members should completely refrain from drinking alcohol (Holy Communion is not practiced), smoking, taking illegal

He too could find nothing about Cameo Coach and had never seen a car like mine – from the '80's. If anyone has some ideas about locating the builder of this car, please let me know. Someone spent a lot of money having the car lengthened only about two feet. There is only room for three passengers in the rear; however they can enjoy stretch out legroom and many amenities. The rear doors were custom made, unlike many limos which use the factory sedan rear doors with the rear wheel arch. The front doors have no frames for the windows. This necessitated larger front window glass and the addition of manual vent windows which rotate out. The collapsible frame for the convertible top over the driver retracts into a cavity above the division window. The custom made fender skirts just look right. All the wood trim in the passenger compartment is REAL wood.

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origins in Salvation Army work during wartimes. At the end of the 19th Century, Staff-Captain Mary Murray was sent by William Booth to support British troops serving in the Boer War in South Africa. Then, in 1901, this same officer was given the task of establishing the Naval and Military League, the forerunner of the Red Shield Services.

Salvation Army officers serving in the Red Shield Services in wartime performed many functions. The Doughnut Girls of World War I are an early example, serving refreshments to troops in the trenches. They also provided first aid stations, ambulances, chaplaincy, social clubs, Christian worship and other frontline services.

This symbol is still widely used as a simple, more readily identifiable symbol in many Salvation Army settings. It is common to see the Red Shield used on casual Salvation Army uniform.

The Salvation Army consistently comes out in research as the charity people would most like to donate to.

Similarly the Red Shield logo is highly desired by companies wishing to link their brand with a solid

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### A Little Bit About Mark VI's

The 1980 model year design revision and change to the Panther platform significantly reduced the size of the vehicle—the new model was 14 inches shorter and rode on a wheelbase 6 inches shorter than before—and the new car was 1,102 lb lighter. Aside from being the only Mark series ever available as a 4-door sedan, the Mark VI retained most of the styling cues of the 1977 Mark V. The models retained the hallmark opera windows, Rolls-Royce style grille, and its characteristic vestigial spare-tire hump on the deck lid.

The Mark was available with Lincoln technology and electronic equipment. A digital instrument cluster using Vacuum Fluorescent Displays, pushbutton keyless entry, automatic overdrive (AOD) 4-speed automatic transmission, and fuel injection on the 302 cu in engine were all new for 1980. Reliability of these systems was problematic for the first few years, which earned these cars a poor reliability record for 1980, 1981, and 1982. Revisions and modifications to the electronics improved the cars' reliability record for 1983.

The new downsized Lincolns received positive reviews by the automotive press, being more efficient and more spacious than the corresponding Cadillacs of the same year that had been downsized for 1977. The new Lincolns used new assembly techniques, and had aluminum pieces in the body and mechanicals to lighten the cars, in addition to the 800 pounds weight loss they received from the redesign. The old 460 cu in V8 was replaced by a fuel-injected version of Ford's 302 cu in V8

(marketed as a "5.0" model), and a carbureted version of the 351 cu in V8, though the latter lasted only for 1980.

The basic body was shared between Town Car and Mark VI, but the Mark bore more resemblance to the Mark V, with hidden headlamps, the spare tire bulge on the trunk, the vinyl top and opera windows, etc. For the only time, the Mark series was offered as a four door sedan, but both Marks were dropped after 1983 in favor of a new Mark VII, and a small Continental sedan (meant to replace Lincoln's unsuccessful Versailles mid-size). The Town Car and Town Coupe bore some resemblance to the old standard Continentals of the 1970s. A Town Coupe was available for both 1980 and 1981, but only about 3,000 were assembled during the two years. The success of the Mark VI, effectively killed off interest in the Town Coupe. The Town Car, continued to be Lincoln's best seller for the rest of the 1980s.

For 1980, a "Signature Series" was available in both coupe and sedan formats. This edition copied the option package from 1979's "Collector's Series" including almost every Lincoln option available. These cars were available in either burgundy or silver exterior colors, and the interior was red only, in either leather or velour. Unique features included a rechargeable glove box flashlight, and a leather bound tool kit in the trunk.

Lincoln offered designer editions for the Town Coupe in 1980. These were the Cartier, Pucci, Blass, and Given-

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emblem of care and compassion.

chy versions. Each designer edition carried exclusive exterior and interior color combinations, as well as more optional equipment over the standard model.

In 1981, the "Signature Series" edition was offered again in red or silver, with a choice of black or white exterior colors being added near the end of the model year. The interior color on these Signature Series cars was red only. The designer editions were offered in 1981 for the coupe model only. These included Bill Blass, Cartier, Emilio Pucci, and Givenchy. the Cartier edition was no longer offered. The "Signature Series" carried on as well, but lost its exclusive colors, as these cars were now available in any exterior color and any interior color. 
