John Trandem's 1972 Mark IV

I first saw my 1972 Lincoln Mark IV about 11 years ago while looking at a 1976 Cadillac Eldorado convertible which was for sale at Lake Melissa near Detroit Lakes, MN. The Eldo was fine, but when I saw the Lincoln I quickly lost interest in the Caddy. Although I hadn't ever owned a Mark IV, I did already

have two Mark Vs and two Continental Town Cars, so I was familiar with Lincolns. The only reason I was even looking at the Eldorado was because I wanted a '70s convertible and I thought a Cad was my only real option. Little did I know, the owner of the Mark IV, David Conmy, (a fellow club member) also had a beautiful and painstakingly crafted '72 Mark IV convertible...but that's another story entirely. I indicated that I was very interested in the Mark and was quickly assured it was not for sale. I didn't end up buying the Caddy either, but remained friends with Dave through many fun and exciting adventures in search of Lincolns, and secured first right of refusal. It was a year or two later when Dave let me know the Lincoln was going to be for sale and asked me if I was still interested. Of course I was, so we arranged a time to travel back to DL and go for a test drive. The car ran and drove very well, and it was then that I got some important details about it.

The window sticker indicated that this was a very early Mark IV with a VIN# 2Y89A801375. On the window sticker written in blue ink are the numbers 8/71 which corresponds with the door tag indicating a production date on August of 1971. I subsequently contacted the Ford Motor Company and was told that their records indicated the car actually rolled off the line July 29th of 1971 and was among the first if not the first Mark IV produced. It is an extremely illequipped car with no options whatsoever. It is triple black, and to date 100% original right down to the paint, which still shows pretty well considering it's age of over 37 years and 74,000 miles. The quality of the original paint looks as

The window sticker clearly states in all caps: ***NOT FOR SALE*** The destination is: Mich Proving Grounds 4035 Mack Road Romeo Mich. The window sticker also indicates that the vehicle was manufactured prior to federal certification, it is believed by the previous owner and confirmed by Ford that this was probably the vehicle used in establishing federal certification for the Mark IV. One additional interesting factoid is this car, as indicated on the sticker, was an opera window delete. It is the only one I have ever seen personally without that option, which was actually made standard early in the '72 production year. Although I love the opera window look, this touch enhances the ultra-clean look of the '72.

Needless to say I bought the car! The only thing I have had to do to it over the years is a little regular detailing, routine maintenance, and replace the tires with the correct 3/8 in. white sidewall tires. I've had a great time driving the car around town, and it always gets looks. Most people think it's a Thunderbird and are always interested to hear the real story. This car was present at the LCOC event in Duluth earlier this year, the first time I've ever had it judged!

Of all the Lincolns I own and have owned this is my favorite. Maybe not the nicest, maybe not the rarest, surely not the most valuable, but I really had to work to get Dave to sell it to me, and I'm sure glad he did! As such an early car I consider it a part of Lincoln history and intend to keep it safe and original for as long as I am able!


