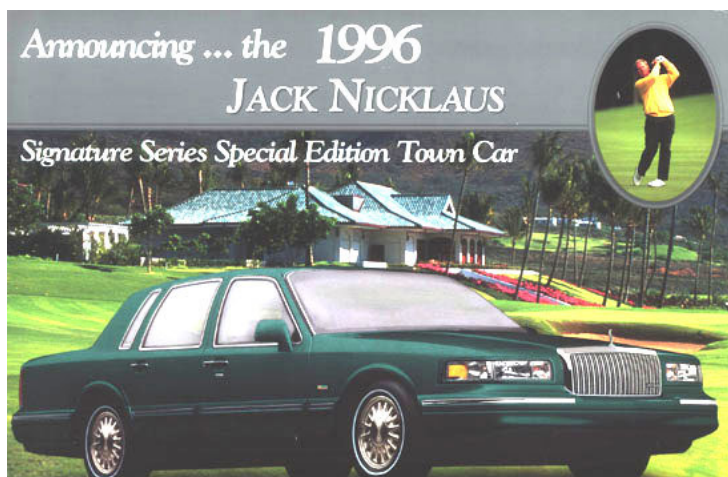

One of the best golfers ever

Jack Nicklaus: "I never went into a tournament or round of golf thinking I had to beat a certain player. I had to beat the golf course. If I prepared myself for a major, went in focused, and then beat the golf course, the rest took care of itself."

Jack William Nicklaus, also known as "The Golden Bear" was born, January 21, 1940, in Columbus, Ohio, the son of a pharmacist. He was raised in the suburb of Upper Arlington, and attended Upper Arlington High School. Overcoming a mild case of polio as a child, he took up golf at the age of 10, shooting a 51 at

Scioto Country Club for his first nine holes ever played. Nicklaus won the first of five straight Ohio State Junior titles at the age of 12. At 13, he broke 70 at Scioto Country Club for the first time. Nicklaus won the Tri-State High School Championship (Ohio/Kentucky/Indiana) at the age of 14 with a round of 68 and recorded his first hole in one in tournament play the same year. At 15, Nicklaus shot a 66 at Scioto Country Club, which was the amateur course record and qualified for his first U.S. Amateur Championship. He won the Ohio Open in 1956 at age 16 highlighted with a phenomenal third round of 64, competing against professionals. In all, Nicklaus won 27 events in the Ohio area from age 10 to age 17.

With the most victories in major championships (18), he was continuously ranked as the world's number one golfer on McCormack's World Golf Rankings from its inception in 1968 to 1977. Having won seven professional major titles between

1962 and 1967, he would likely have been considered number one in some of those years as well (a period when he, Arnold Palmer and Gary Player vied for that status in public acclaim as *The Big Three*). After 1978, while much younger players such as Tom Watson and Seve Ballesteros came to be ranked higher than him, Nicklaus continued to regularly challenge for and indeed win many major titles until 1986, making a full quarter-century in which he competed at the very highest level of his sport. Indeed, over the course of this 25-year period of 100 major championships as a professional, Nicklaus finished either first or second 36 times, in the top three 45 times, the top five 54 times, and the top 10 67 times. Nicklaus and the other 45 major championship winners during this period combined for a total of 119 major championship victories, 704 official PGA Tour wins, and over

Testing the 1993 Lincoln Town Car

In town. Out of town. One jet. One prop job. Two bags of pretzels. O'Hare and the people mover. Too much mail. Too many phone calls. Finally Friday. End of a long week. Jump in the test car and head home.

At last, peace and contentment as the '93 Lincoln Town Car moves along the expressway. Comfort, quiet and a suspension tuned to cushion you from every tar mark in the road. It's as if this hunk of metal were floating 2 inches off the pavement.

Come to think of it, once the tensions of the week had drained away, that soft, cushy, floating suspension became somewhat irritating. Too soft and too cushy. You don't want to be jostled and jarred every time you drive over an asphalt cavity, but you want to have some feel of pavement underneath. You're never too old for a security blanket.

If Lincoln had been reading the tea leaves, it would have realized that the luxury cars attracting the most attention are those geared for performance: the Cadillac Seville STS, the Infiniti J30, the Lexus GS300, cars loaded with all the creature comforts but equipped with engines and transmissions and especially suspensions that permit aggressive driving.

The Lincoln Town Car suspension seems to be designed to satisfy those suffering from hemorrhoids. What was odd was that our car came with a handling suspension package (\$278). Hmm. How soft could the base suspension be if pillows cost an extra \$278?

The Town Car is powered by Ford's single-overhead-cam, 16-valve, 190-horsepower version of its 32-valve, 280-horsepower, 4.6-liter V-8 in the Mark VIII. Give it credit for smoothness and quiet, but naturally it doesn't have the pep of the 32-valve, considering the poundage it is required to move. A couple times at hard acceleration the engine seemed to hesitate a fraction of a second, as if pausing for an instant to take a gulp of oxygen before resuming the race.

The single-overhead-cam 4.6 is rated at 18 m.p.g. city/26 highway.

In addition to sporting all the creature comforts in terms of standard power equipment, the Town Car focuses on safety. Driver- and passenger-side air bags are standard, along with four-wheel anti-lock brakes. To silence critics who complain that seat belts ride against neck, chin or cheek and are too uncomfortable to use, the Town Car features sliding belt adjusters in the door pillars.

The Town Car is designed to provide occupants quiet, comfortable, casual long-distance motoring to the vacation retreat so that you're well-rested once you arrive-safely.

Kudos to the engineers and stylists for adding driver and front-seat passenger

825 additional individual professional victories (excludes Champions Tour events, etc.). While other marquee players such as Nick Faldo, Tom Kite, Nick Price, Payne Stewart, and Curtis Strange were winning numerous tournaments worldwide, they had yet to break through with major wins prior to 1987, but proved to be on the verge of doing so. These facts make this period arguably the most competitive in the history of professional golf and illustrate Nicklaus' ability and durability over time.

After winning two U.S. Amateur Championships in 1959 and 1961, and challenging for the 1960 U.S. Open, Nicklaus turned professional toward the end of 1961. The 1962 U.S. Open was both Nicklaus' first major championship victory and his first professional win. This win over Arnold Palmer began the on-course rivalry between the two. In 1966, Nicklaus won the Masters Tournament for the second year in a row, becoming the first

fold-down center armrests. But how about replacing that stiff nylon thread on the armrest tops with something softer? Each armrest also houses a foldout cup holder, which, of course, earns the designers extra credit. Buttons in the center of the dash allow you to activate the rear-window defroster and open the gas-tank filler door easily.

The Town Car interior is simple and doesn't overwhelm you with gadgets. Everything is within easy sight and reach. There's nothing so confusing you have to pause and ask, "Where is it?" or, "How do you use it?" In further paying attention to detail, Ford has positioned an arrow along the instrument-panel fuel gauge to let you know on which side the fuel-filler door is, making for easier entry at the filling station.

Considering such care for the consumer, we have to wonder who dropped the ball in designing the outside rearview mirrors. The dual power mirrors are tiny and provide awkward angles for the motorist. Where is that car that was behind us only a minute ago now that we want to pull out to pass? All that luxury, yet the mirrors were shortchanged.

If we could make a couple other changes, one would be to increase trunk height a good 2 inches. For years Ford Motor Co. cars featured those intolerable deep-dish design circular trunk holds that are ideal for carrying inflated inner tubes but couldn't handle anything square or rectangular. The Town Car has a flat floor that can accommodate square or rectangular packages-but not very many.

The other change would be to widen the accelerator pedal and attach a less slippery surface to it. On a couple occasions our foot slipped off, hardly a confidence builder.

The 1993 Town Car Signature Series we tested has a base price of \$35,700. Standard equipment includes air conditioning; power, anti-lock brakes; power steering; cruise control; tilt steering; 15-inch, steel-belted radial tires, power windows; remote-control deck-lid release; rear-window defroster; power door locks; tinted glass; remote, keyless entry system (push buttons on the key fob to lock/unlock the doors); color-keyed bumpers and body side moldings; electronic digital clock; front and rear floor mats; AM/FM stereo with cassette player and power antenna; cloth seats; leather-wrapped steering wheel; and dual coverage sun visors (two visors on each side, to provide side- and front-window protection).

Options on the test car included a power moonroof at \$1,550, alarm at \$295, memory seats at \$548, traction assist at \$222, automatic dimming mirror at \$111, leather seats at \$570, JBL audio system at \$576 and trunk-mounted

golfer to achieve this, and also won The Open Championship, completing his career slam of major championships and at 26, the youngest to do so at the time. After failing to win a major in 1968 and 1969, Nicklaus won another Open Championship in 1970.

Between 1971 and 1980, he would win a further nine major championships, overtake 'Bobby Jones' record of 13 majors, and become the first player to complete double and triple career slams of golf's four professional major championships. Nicklaus also won the prestigious Players Championship a record three times during this period. At the age of 46, Nicklaus claimed his 18th and final major championship at the 1986 Masters Tournament, becoming that championship's oldest winner. (Julius Boros is the oldest major championship winner, having won the 1968 PGA Championship at the age of 48.) Nicklaus joined the

Senior PGA Tour (now known as the Champions Tour) in January 1990, when he became eligible, and by April 1996 had won 10 of the tour's tournaments, including eight of that tour's major championships despite playing a very limited schedule. Nicklaus' final U.S. Open was held at Pebble Beach Golf Links in 2000, where he shot 73-82 to miss the cut. Later in the year, he was paired with Tiger Woods and Vijay Singh in his final PGA Championship only a few days after the death of his mother, where he also missed the cut by one shot. In both tournaments, Nicklaus provided last minute heroics by reaching the par-5 18th in two shots in the U.S. Open and nearly holing his wedge shot for eagle at the par-5 18th in the PGA Championship.

Nicklaus played without much preparation in the 2005 Masters, a month after the drowning death of his 17-month-old grandson Jake (child of his son, Steve) on March 1, 2005. He and Steve played

The factory 1992 and 1993 Jack Nicklaus Signature Editions came in metallic green or white exterior colors with a metal logo on the dash and front fenders, similar to the 1996 and 1997 metal emblem but with green background for the "Jack Nicklaus" and gold background for the "Signature Edition" lettering. These JN Editions had white leather interior with green stitching on the Lincoln emblem on the seats, and green carpeting and green floor mats with the bear logo. Most JN Editions with green exteriors had a full white vinyl top and 15" wheels and tires.

The 1996 Jack Nicklaus Editions had the Medium Willow Green or the solid white exterior with the Oxford White/Light Graphite interior trim, 16" wheels and tires and probably the touring package. The metal emblem was the same as the 1997s. They had the bear logo on the floor mats and the lettering on the dash. The power moon roof may have been optional. In 1997, the colors were the two toned exterior and interior combination on my 1997 Jack Nicklaus Signature Edition Town Car, including the touring-handling package, and the two toned white exterior. 1997 was the last year for the Jack Nicklaus Signature Editions. The total number of Jack Nicklaus Editions produced is unclear. There is some question about other aftermarket Jack Nicklaus packages some dealers may have made in other colors from 1992 to 1994.

There was the factory 1996 Diamond Anniversary Edition in burgundy or silver exterior with distinctive lettering on the opera window, two toned light gray and light graphite leather

interior, touring-handling package and other select features.

Options included a paint strip down the side, leather seats, wood instrument panel trim, window badging, cellular telephone, power moonroof, JBL audio system, auto electrochromatic dimming mirror w/compass, and traction assist.

Also introduced in 1996 were the Ride Control and Touring Edition packages. Ride Control was only available on Signature and Cartier while Touring Edition was available for all Town Car models. Ride control featured an auxiliary power steering fluid cooler, 16-inch aluminum wheels, 225/60/16 tires, 3.27 axle ratio, 28.5 mm (1.1 in) stabilizer bar, as well as revised air springs and shocks. Touring Edition featured (depending on model), a power moonroof, JBL audio system, electro-

compact-disc player/changer at \$833. One option done away with for 1993 is the Insta-Clear windshield, which removed ice or snow in seconds but gave the glass a pinkish-mauve appearance that annoyed many. With a \$625 freight charge, the Town Car stickered at \$41,308, which puts it in the same price range as the Cadillac Seville STS. The Town Car is aimed toward older drivers looking for rest, the STS toward younger motorists who are restless.

golf as therapy for their grief following the death. After days of playing, it was Steve who suggested his dad return to The Masters. He made that his last appearance in the tournament. Later in 2005, Nicklaus finished his professional career at The Open Championship played at St Andrews on July 15, 2005. Nicklaus turned 65 in January that year, which was the last year he could enter The Open Championship as an exempt player. He played with Luke Donald and Tom Watson in his final round. After hitting his tee shot off the 18th tee in the second round, Nicklaus received a ten-minute standing ovation from the crowd. Soon afterwards, Nicklaus ended his career with a fitting birdie, holing a fifteen-foot birdie putt on the 18th green. Nicklaus missed the 36-hole cut with a score of +3 (147).

The last competitive tournament in which Nicklaus played in the United States was

Nicklaus was named a Big Ten 'Icon' by the Big Ten Network in September 2010. The Big Ten Network named 50 Big Ten Conference Icons, and Nicklaus was #18.

Nicklaus has also taken part in various off-course activities, including golf course design, charitable work, book writing, magazine article contributions, video productions, and running his own tournament on the PGA Tour, the Memorial Tournament. His thriving golf course design company is one of the largest in the world. Nicklaus' books vary from instructional to autobiographical, with his *Golf My Way* considered one of the best instructional golf books of all time (influencing Greg Norman among others); the video of the same name is the best-selling golf instructional to date.

chromic automatic dimming mirror, auxiliary power steering fluid cooler, 16-inch aluminum wheels, 225/60/16 tires, 3.27 axle ratio, 28.5 mm (1.1 in) stabilizer bar, and revised air springs and shocks. Both the Ride Control and Touring Edition packages would last only between 1996 and 1997; however, the Touring Edition package would make a brief comeback during the 2000 model year.

There are many aftermarket dealer installed packages, some distinctive to certain states. Some of these came with vinyl roofs, logos, options, distinctive color combinations and certain colors shared with other Town Cars. Some may have had custom leather interior. It is difficult to say where some of these came from. Florida seems to have many different dealer packages, some built on the Executive series, others on the Signature series. Reportedly, dealers would modify or add to an existing Town Car to make it a "Special Edition".

The Designer Series Special Edition Factory option packages produced unique Lincolns which gave potential buyers a distinctive Lincoln Town Car with many options. These included the Black Tie Signature Edition, the 1995 Spinnaker Edition, the 1996 Diamond Anniversary Edition, and others. Although the drive train was shared with other Town Cars, the interior was sometimes distinctive to the particular factory edition, and these Town Cars were usually loaded with options. Such was the case with the 1995 Spinnaker Edition, which had a blue and light tan two toned leather interior and the 1996 Diamond Anniversary Edition which had a two toned leather interior.

Also, there were unique badges or insignia such as the metal wording logo on the side of the Jack Nicklaus Edition, the wording in the simulated wood trim on the dash and the exterior wording on the Spinnaker Edition. There were usually select luxury options included also, and some had vinyl or cloth tops.
